Kunsthalle Wien announces programme under new artistic director Michelle Cotton

Today, Kunsthalle Wien announces its new programme under the artistic direction of Michelle Cotton, who joined the organisation in June 2024.

The programme builds on Kunsthalle Wien's thirty-two-year legacy of producing internationally significant exhibitions and providing a platform for discourse, experimentation and exchange between artists and audiences. The Kunsthalle's exhibition programme will continue to bring new ideas, research and artistic practices to the city of Vienna. As Stadt Wien's primary institution for contemporary art, the programme will continue to reflect the diverse communities of Vienna that it serves and in addition, from 2025, will devote a series of solo exhibitions to artists from non-European countries. The new programme begins this autumn in the Museumsquartier with the first solo exhibitions in Austria by Aleksandra Domanović and Diego Marcon.

Aleksandra Domanović

Aleksandra Domanović, who studied at the University of Applied Arts in Vienna (2001–2006), will be the subject of a major survey, bringing together works produced over the past eighteen years including sculpture, video, print, photography and digital media. Her inquiries often focus on the intersections of technology, history, and culture, exploring the ways they shape contemporary society and identity. Installed over one thousand square metres of exhibition space on the first floor of the Museumsquartier building it will be the largest presentation of her work to date. Kunsthalle Wien will also publish the first monographic book on Domanović's work to accompany the exhibition.

Diego Marcon

Diego Marcon's exhibition will see the ground floor space of Kunsthalle Wien in the Museumsquartier transformed for the presentation of *La Gola* (2024), a new film that has been co-commissioned with Centre d'Art Contemporain Genève and Kunstverein in Hamburg. Marcon's works draw upon different cinematic vocabularies, shifting between genres from musicals to melodrama; from horror to slapstick comedy. *La Gola* is structured by a series of letters between two correspondents, Gianni and Rosanna, who are each absorbed in their own narrative, moving between the poetic and the revolting. This exhibition will also be accompanied by a new book, jointly published by the three institutions.

Kunsthalle Wien is also inaugurating an annual commission for a temporary, site-specific artwork for the exterior of the Museumsquartier building. Nora Turato has been commissioned to produce a work that will be on view for a year. Turato's primary material is language and the power structures involved in spoken and written forms. This new 62-metre, text-based work will stretch around the south-west wall of the building, visible to passers-by as they traverse the outer arc of the Museumsquartier.

Group Surveys

A series of group surveys based on original research will punctuate the programme. The first of these, *Radical Software: Women, Art & Computing 1960–1991* will open in 2025, presenting the work of approximately fifty artists including painting, sculpture, installation, photography, film and a large number of computer-generated drawings and texts. This exhibition adopts a feminist perspective on the history of artists' experiments in the pre-internet era of computing. It is co-produced with MUDAM Musée d'Art Moderne Grand-Duc Jean, Luxembourg and will be accompanied by a new publication including 27 artist interviews. In 2026, there will be a major new exhibition surveying contemporary art production in Vienna.

Focus on Mediation & Inclusion Programmes

Kunsthalle Wien's educational programmes will be a key focus under the new direction. They will receive more resources, prominence and visibility. In 2024 the Kunsthalle will open a new Atelier for education and inclusion work in the Museumsquartier. Situated directly on the Museumsplatz, the Atelier is conceived as a barrier-free, versatile space for creativity. In addition to hosting the Kunsthalle's talks, workshops and activities for children, young people, families and schools, greater focus will be given to inclusion programmes. These include initiatives being developed with partner organisations from the social sector. We will also continue to collaborate with universities and educational institutions in and outside of Vienna. Additionally, the Kunsthalle will introduce *Leichte Sprache* exhibition information and tours in *Einfacher Sprache*.

Kunsthalle Wien's space at Karlsplatz will be extended, reducing its café and changing its entrance to create better access and visibility. The programme will run until the end of September when it will close for renovation before reopening in January 2025 with the 10th edition of the Kunsthalle Wien Prize. This annual exhibition, produced in collaboration with the Academy of Fine Arts Vienna and the University of Applied Arts Vienna, will focus on the work of two recent graduates (one from each university), producing their first institutional exhibitions and publication after graduation.

Aleksandra Domanović (b. 1981, Novi Sad) has held solo exhibitions at the Galleria d'Arte Moderna, Milan (2019); Museum of Contemporary Art Cleveland (2018); Bundeskunsthalle, Bonn; the Henry Moore Institute, Leeds (both 2017); Oakville Galleries (2016); ICA Winnipeg; Atlanta Contemporary Art Center, Georgia; Museum Boijmans Van Beuningen, Rotterdam (all 2015); Kunstverein Hildesheim; Gallery of Modern Art, Glasgow, Firstsite, Colchester; Passerelle Centre d'art contemporain, Brest (all 2014); Kunsthalle Basel (2012). Her work has also been presented within numerous international survey exhibitions including the Greater Taipei Biennial of Contemporary Arts (2022); the 34th Ljubljana Biennial of Graphic Arts; the 58th Belgrade Biennial; the Baltic Triennial 14, Vilnius (all 2021); New Museum Triennial, New York (2015); Shanghai Biennale (2014); 12th Biennale de Lyon (2013); First Kyiv Biennale and the Marrakech Biennale 4th Edition (both 2012). Domanović lives and works in Berlin.

Nora Turato (b. 1991, Zagreb) has held solo exhibitions at the Museum of Modern Art, New York (2022); Secession, Vienna (2021); Centre Pompidou, Paris; The International Centre of Graphic Arts, Ljubljana (both 2020); Serralves Museum of Contemporary Art, Porto (2019) and Kunstmuseum Liechtenstein (2019). Her work has also been presented within significant international surveys including the Performa Biennial 2023; New York; Post-Capital: Art and the Economics of the Digital Age at MUDAM Luxembourg and Kunsthal Charlottenborg, Copenhagen (2021 and 2022 respectively); INFORMATION (Today), Kunsthalle Basel and Astrup Fearnley Museet, Oslo (2021 and 2022 respectively); Cleveland Triennial for Contemporary Art (2022) and the Belgrade Biennale (2021). Turato lives and works in Amsterdam.

Diego Marcon (b. 1985, Busto Arsizio, Italy) has held solo exhibitions at Kunstverein in Hamburg (2024); Kunsthalle Basel; Centro Pecci, Prato; Fondazione Nicola Trussardi, Milan (all 2023); Museo Madre, Naples (2021); Institute of Contemporary Art Singapore/LASALLE, Singapore (2019); and Triennale Milano, Milan (2018). His work has also been presented within numerous group surveys including *Nebula*, organised by Fondazione In Between Art Film for the 60th Venice Biennale; the *Biennale de l'Image en Mouvement 2024*, Centre d'Art Contemporain Geneva (both 2024); the 59th Venice Biennale (2022) and at Fondazione Prada, Milan and Museo MAXXI, Rome (both 2018). Marcon's films have also been screened at Cannes Film Festival (2021); International Film Festival Rotterdam and the Viennale, Vienna (2021). Marcon lives and works in Milan.
